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#### Cavitation bubble effect in localized power deposition processes in liquids

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### Bubble examples/scale

Localized energy deposition in liquids where bubbles play roles:

-underwater arc/spark discharges
 /oil & gas application, rock breaking well restimulation/

-micro-EDM /hole making in metals and metal alloys/

-**laser – material interaction in liquids** /pinning, eye surgery, ablation/

# Why bubbles are important?



- Bubble collapse results in large pressure increase
- Shock waves
- Surface material splashing



# Bubble formation theory

- Still not widely used
- Radiation absorption often wrongly neglected

#### Underwater localized energy deposition (0D) implemented in MATLAB GRC Model Highlights

- Bubble is treated as a thermodynamic system whose state is set by P, T and R
- Spherical bubble dynamics in a compressible liquid (Keller-Kolodner\* model)
- Heat loss mechanisms include radiation and vapor condensation/evaporation
- Pressure computed using ideal gas law with dissociation
- Acoustic pressure rise in surrounding liquid is calculated
- Radiative heat flux computed for specified pressure, temperature and bubble size – lookup tables generated for given ranges of above parameters

## Bubble formation model

#### Model assumptions

- 1) The contents of the **bubble are homogeneous and in thermodynamic equilibrium**.
- 2) The gas in the bubble obeys the **ideal gas law**, with modifications to account for the fact that water vapor in the bubble is dissociated. Ionization is neglected.
- 3) The bubble **is optically thick**, wherein emissivity of the bubble was calculated using the Rosseland weighting approach, which calculates a frequency averaged photon mean free path.
- **4)** A dissipation length was assumed to calculate the fraction of emitted radiation absorbed by the surrounding water.
- 5) Mass flow from evaporation and condensation model by Schrage.
- 6) Thermal loss from the bubble due to conduction into liquid was ignored

#### Model validation

## Laser ablation in liquids



**1. Early stage** – laser energy absorption, material ejection, plume formation

2. Intermediate stage – plume expansion, SWs propagation, cavitation bubble development, oscillations

**3. Late stage** – Bubble collapse, plume mixing with the liquid, NP coalescence/aggregation processes.

#### **Pressure on the target:**

-from laser heating : SW propagation in the target and rarefaction wave (tensile pressure) is formed behind

-from the backscattering plasma plume: additional heating and pressure

-from the collapsing cavitation bubble and water micro-jet



### Laser ablation in liquids





#### -bubble formation (liquid)

-confinement=> different ablation threshold and yield
-shock wave formation
What are the roles of laser, plasma and of cavitation bubble?

Confinement by liquid

=>Hydrodynamic modeling

- 2T semi-empirical equations of state (for metal, gold here)
- EOS for water

 $I(t)=I_0 \exp(-4\ln 2 t^2/\tau^2)$ ,  $\tau=200 \text{ fs}$ , 800 nm,  $I_0 = 2$ , 3, 4, 5 × 10<sup>13</sup> W/cm<sup>2</sup>

Fig. 9 Normalized bubble volumes  $\Omega(t)$  versus time for the different particle velocities  $u_p$  and bubble diameters D: (a) D = 5 nm,  $u_p = 1.0, 1.5, 2.0, 2.5, 3.0$  and 3.5 km s<sup>-1</sup>; (b) D = 3, 5 and 7 nm,  $u_p = 3.0$  km s<sup>-1</sup>.





# Summary and future work



- Cavitation bubbles are important phenomena to account when there is a localized large energy deposition in liquids
- Bubble formation theory exists and provides good insight into bubble dynamics
- Large pressure at the bubble collapse stage results in surface material splashing, shock waves both in liquids and surface materials
- MD simulations of bubble formation have recently been successful
- Future work can focus on a creation of a comprehensive model for laser ablation in

fluids accounting for a cavitation bubble effect
