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Numerical Study of Early Oxidation Effect on Wettability of



Laser-treated Surface





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
1.0 Introduction


Surface texturing by direct laser ablation creates micro- and nano-scale roughness on materials, resulting in an increased surface area and surface energy modifications [1]. In particular, micro- and nanotextured surfaces find numerous applications in virus and bacterial repulsion, including the osseointergration process in biomedical implants [2]. However, surface oxidation and other chemical modifications cause changes in wettability over time. Despite the significance of these changes, the underlying reasons are not yet fully understood [2-4]. To gain further insights into these effects, we performed reactive molecular dynamics (RMD) simulations to understand the effect of early oxidation on wettability of laser-treated titanium (Ti) (Fig. 1).



5.0 Results and Discussion

The RMD simulations were performed at a temperature of 100K and raised rapidly to 300K, 500 K, and 1000 K, respectively. The obtained results show that oxide thickness increases with time (Fig. 4a). Hence, the TiOx layer grows more quickly in the early stages (0-130 ps) than it does in the later stages (130-300 ps). This condition is brought on by an increase in the TiOx layer and a decrease in O2 diffusion (Fig. 2). We subsequently performed the wetting studies on the Ti and TiOx (Fig. 3(a)(b)). The obtained results show that the presence of oxide makes the droplet behavior less hydrophobic (Fig. 4a) in agreement with experimental observations [5].







5.0 Conclusion

- The surface chemistry of laser-treated surfaces plays a pivotal role in how the wettability changes over time. Our calculations shed light on the early oxidation process of titanium (Ti) and its impact on the wetting properties of such surfaces.
- Experimental observations align with our findings, indicating that the presence of oxide on the surface diminishes the hydrophobic behavior of droplets.

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
