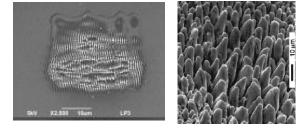

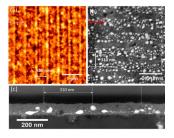

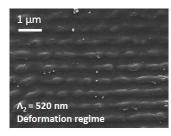


Laser-induced surface/volume structures

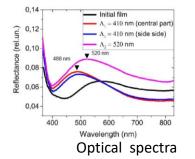

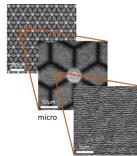

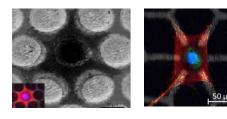

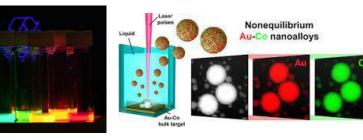


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Laser Interactions

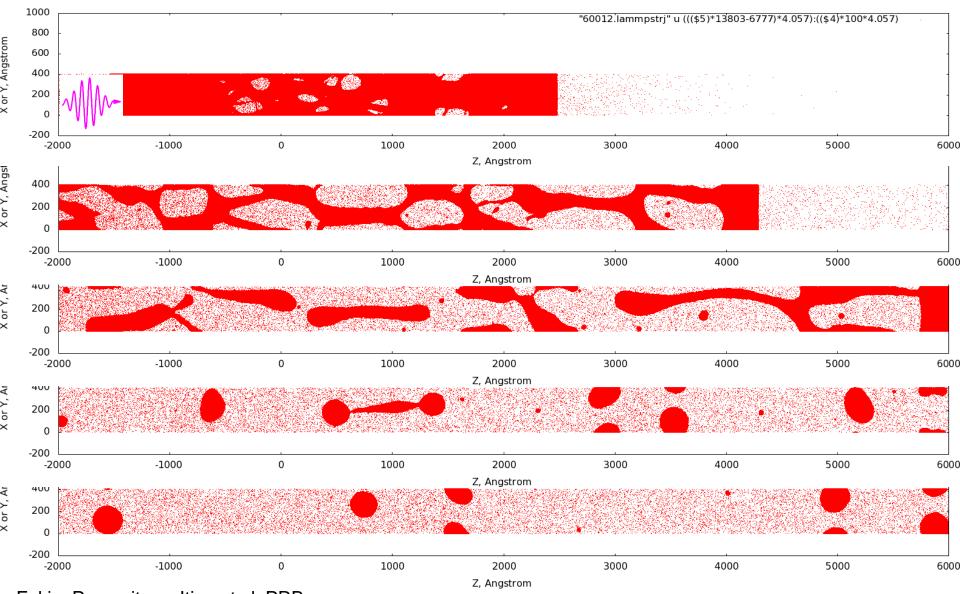
Laser interaction commonly involve:

- Energy propagation, electronic excitation, light scattering, reflection and absorption
- Electron-phonon relaxation, heat diffusion, pressure wave propagation, rarefaction and tensile stress, phase transitions, mechanical fragmentation
- Materal removal (ablation), plasma plume expansion, reactions, clustering, etc...
- Often multi-pulse irradiation is used with various scanning and focusing conditions

Laser-induced nanoparticle formation

- Green synthesis methods, biocompatibility
- Control over NP properties
- Scaling-up possibilities
- Possibility to create stable ultrastructures, nanoalloys, hybrids, etc.
- Additional laser-particle interactions involve many physical and chemical processes

Ablation & Nanoparticles (10M atoms, F=1 J/cm², Al)

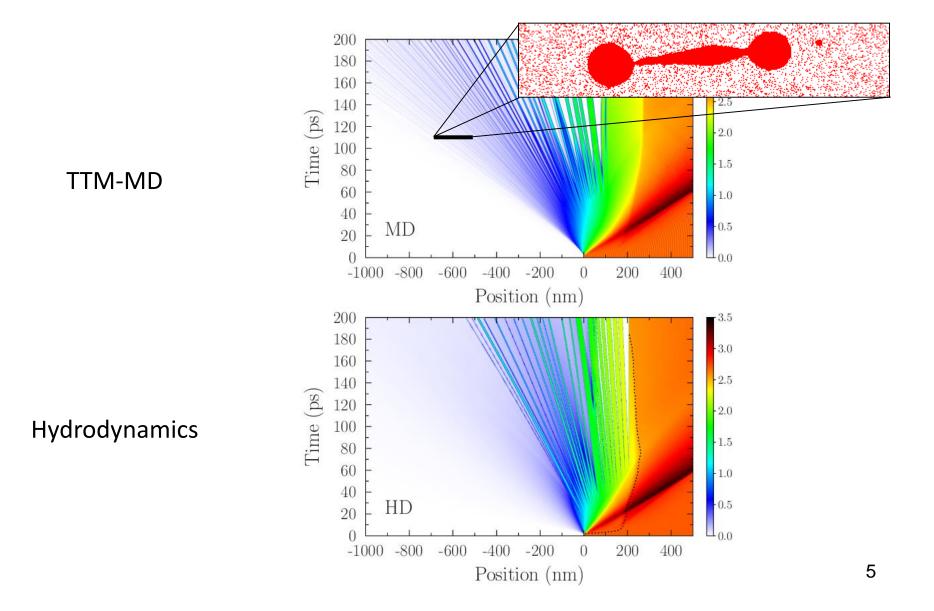

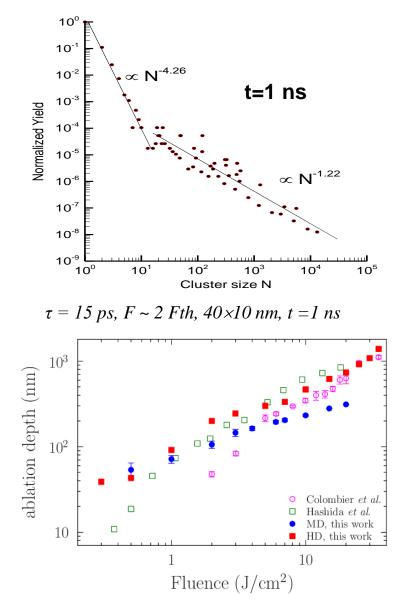

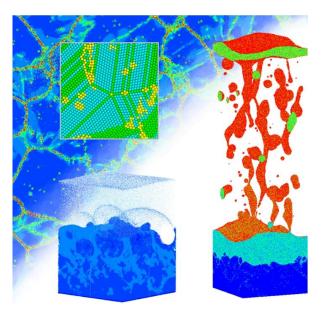
AI, $F = 2 \text{ J/cm}^2$

Allow to get nanoparticle size distributions and describe non-equilibrium processes



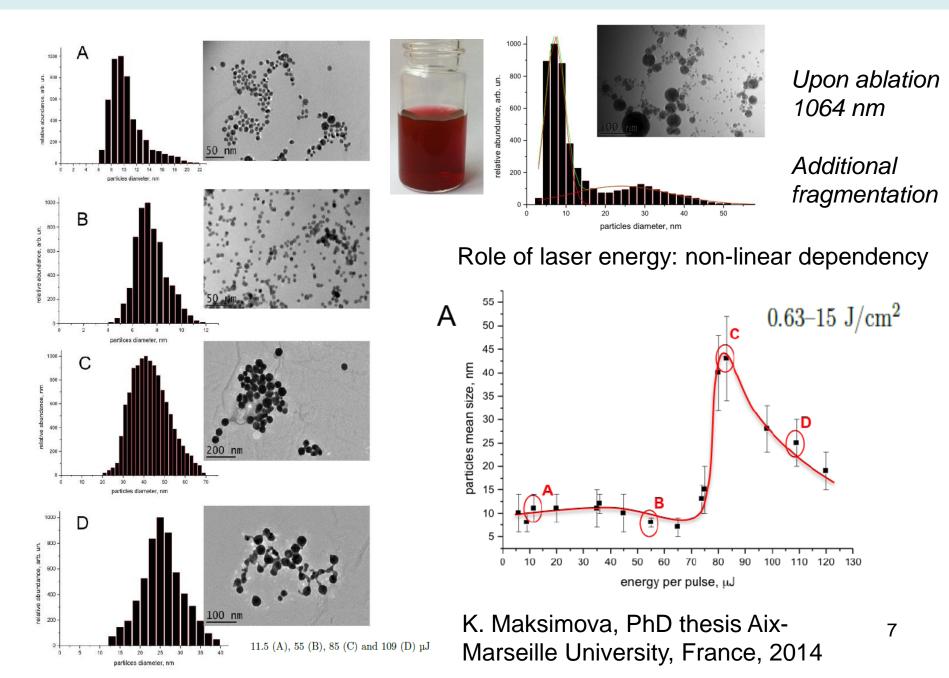

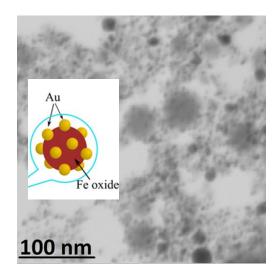

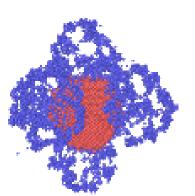
Non-linear Effects in fs Laser Interactions with Au NPs

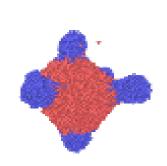


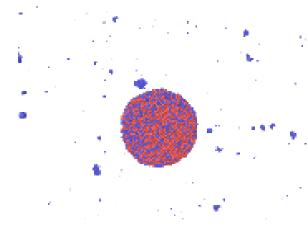
Complex Nano-Objects Formation by Laser Co-Ablation



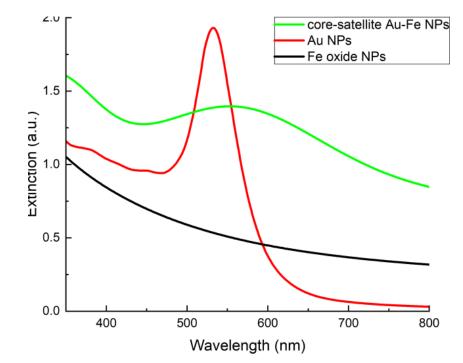
:STEM image of nanostructures, obtained by mixing of negatively charged laser-ablated Au NPs and positively charged laser-ablated Fe oxide NPs. Right: Calculated extinction spectra of bare Au NPs (red line), Fe oxide NPs (black line) and core-satellite Au-Fe NPs (green line).

SUMMARY



Laser is a very powerful and versatile tool suitable not only for laser ablation but also for nanoparticle synthesis for optics, catalysis, cancer treatment, solar cells, sensors, anti-bacterial applications, etc.

- The main involved processes include laser absorption, electronic excitation/relaxation, lattice heating and cooling.
- Particle size, composition, geometry, atomic masses, binding energies, excess energy, environment, heating/cooling protocol are important.

Namely, MD simulations of fast NP heating have shown :

- (i) When different nanoparticles interact with a laser they may either fragment, sinter or mix depending on their sizes and heating/cooling rate. To reach alloying without fragmentation NP should not be over-heated.
- (ii) Laser can help cleating complex multi-material nano-objects with promising optical, catalytical and plasmono-magnetic properties.
