# Laser Ablation (LA) for NP Formation



- Ablation threshold fluence
- Target material is heated and ejected
- Nanoparticles (NPs): in vacuum, in a background gas or a liquid
- Colloidal nanoparticles
- Scaling up is possible

# **Spark Discharge (SD) for NP Formation**

### **Typical set-up**

- Breakdown voltage
- Electrodes are heated and evaporated
- Nanoparticles are formed
- Scaling-up is possible

after single laser pulse with different wavelengths ( $\lambda$ ) and beam diameters (*d*).  $\blacklozenge$ ,  $\lambda = 1064$  nm, *d*(FWHM) = 20  $\mu$ m;  $\blacksquare$ ,  $\lambda = 532$  nm, *d*(FWHM) = 9.5  $\mu$ m;  $\blacklozenge$ ,  $\lambda = 266$  nm, *d*(FWHM) = 6.5  $\mu$ m.



# Crater depth defines the amount of the ejected material and strongly depends on the experimental conditions (laser or spark parameters)

# **Typical Time Scales of NP Formation in SD**



~99% of vapor is condensed during the nucleation phase

In most of the considered cases, nucleation and coagulation could be calculated separately

#### Laser interactions commonly involve:

- Energy propagation, electronic excitation, light scattering, reflection and absorption
- Electron-phonon relaxation, heat diffusion, pressure wave propagation, rarefaction and tensile stress, phase transitions, mechanical fragmentation

#### Often multi-pulse irradiation is used with various scanning and focusing conditions

Laser-induced nanoparticle formation, sintering and fragmentation

- Green synthesis methods, biocompatibility
- Control over NP properties
- Scaling-up possibilities
- Possibility to create stable ultrastructures, nanoalloys, hybrids, etc.
- Additional laser-particle interactions involve many physical and chemical processes
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# **Ion-impregnated Porous Thin Films Treated by Laser**

sol-gel mesoporous films are prepared and impregnated by saults
these samples are then irradiated by laser

Porous films:  $SiO_2$ ,  $TiO_2$ 

Sol-gel synthesized Porosity ~ 10% Porous size 5-7 nm

### Metallic NPs:

Ag, Au

Produced by soaking in metallic salts solutions with consequent reduction Initial size < 3-5 nm Laser irradiation: CW Nanosecond Picosecond Femtosecond

# **Pulsed Laser Ablation in Liquids: PLAL**



**1.** Early stage – laser energy absorption, material ejection, plume formation

**2.** Intermediate stage – plume expansion in the presence of a confining liquid environment

**3.** Late stage – plume mixing with the liquid, NP coalescence/aggregation processes.

- Upper layers cross the spinodal and enter into unstable liquid-gas region (orange zone). NPs can be formed here.
- Some trajectories reach supersaturated gas region, where condensation takes place, but this process will not yeild many particles

### **MD** simulations for NPs: Sintering or Alloy NP formation

Alloy miscibility plays a role even for fast heating.

Very fast cooling allows one to create/quench non-equilibrium structures.

# **NP Sintering or Alloying**

- Simulation starts from a Janus configuration
- Then both particles are heated to the same temperature
- Then, the system is cooled down back to room temperature

Core-shells can be formed when one particle is much larger and is composed of a material with different cohesive energy

When the element with the higher **cohesive energy** also has the larger Wigner-Seitz **radius**, its core preference decreases, and thus this combination forms less segregated structures than what one would expect from the cohesive energy difference alone.

Highly segregated structures (highly segregated core-shell or Janus-like) are expected to form when both the relative cohesive energy difference is greater than ~20%, and the relative Wigner-Seitz radius difference is  $_{49}$ greater than ~4%.

### Laser Interactions with NP in Ethanol: Surface Chemistry



Beyond the physical transitions, the local interface between dissociated ethanol and the molten sphere is responsible for **the oxidative/reductive interactions** resulting in the formation of catalytic-augmented Cu<sup>3+</sup> by-product.

- Can one predict/calculate NP size, distribution, amount?
   -To some extend if there is enough data.
- Are NP sizes different or similar for spark and for laser ablation ? –Can be rather similar, but there are differences.
- What parameters affect NP formation? -Absorbed energy, pressure, temperature, concentration, ...
- Can modeling explain experimental results? -Several examples have been shown.
- AI will also provide new perspectives.
